

On Saturday night, three men, armed with pistols, entered the house of Edward Russell, a respectable farmer, near Roscrea, and demanded from him £20, the price of pigs sold at the fair of Rathdowney. Mrs. Russell told them all the money her husband had, he gave to a neighbour, whereupon they knocked Russell down, and cut him severely. Not having found any money, they decamped.

On Saturday night, as James Pierce, of Eglis, was opening the door of his house, three men, two of whom were armed, rushed in, presenting a pistol at his head. They then made him go on his knees, told him to keep down his head, and that if he stirred, they would blow his brains out. Pierce's niece ran to a chest of drawers, in which was a bond for £50. Miss Pierce took the bond, which they soon found in her possession, and tore in pieces. James Pierce was then robbed of a silver watch, chain and keys, and the pistol that remained in the chest.

At an inquest held at Corcomroe abbey, on Saturday, by Thomas Whitestone, Esq. coroner, on the body of William Keane, who was on the out door relief list, the jury found a verdict of—Death from want of sufficient food.

On Monday, John Cox, Esq. coroner, Newcastle held an inquest on the body of a man named Patrick M'Eniry, who was found dead on the Ballinlehan mountain—verdict, died by the visitation of God.

We have been favoured with a view of the magnificent painting of Eyemouth Harbour, a prize obtained by Doctor Gibson, at the recent distribution of paintings belonging to the Royal Society for the Promotion of Fine Arts in Scotland. This is the second valuable painting which the Doctor has been fortunate enough to obtain within a few years from this society.
