DEATH BY DROWNING.—Monday evening the workmen employed at the milling concerns of Messrs. J. N. Russell & Sons, at the Canal, observed the body of a female in the water of the mill race, and having sent for the Police to George's-quay station, Sub-Constable Nash proceeded to the spot, and they raised the corpse of a handsome young woman, fashionably attired, and who did not appear to have been long in the water. Until the Town Crier was sent out to announce the discovery, though many persons had seen the body, no clue could be had to her identity; however in the evening it was ascertained that the name of the unfortunate female was Ann Keffe, (daughter of a pensioner who died three weeks since), of Queen-st., milliner and dress maker, who was missing from her lodgings since Friday night. From certain facts which transpired on inquiry, suspicion attaches to a man in the employ of Messrs. Russell, and with whom the deceased was intimate. He was arrested last night by Constable Nash, but bailed to appear at the Coroner's inquest this day.

Friday last, John Cox, Esq. coroner, held an inquest on a man name not known, who was transferred the previous day from the Rathkeale fever hospital, and died at the door of the Newcastle workhouse. Verdict—Died from starvation.

Sunday last, Dr. Enright, coroner, held an inquest in the court-house of Rathkeale on the body of Maurice Walsh, who, in consequence of the crowded state of the workhouse, was put out, with his wife, and had to sleep in the open air on Friday night. The master of the workhouse and relieving officer were examined. Dr. Paterson gave it as his opinion that Walsh died of disease of the lungs, brought on by cold and hunger, and the jury returned a verdict—"Died of starvation, for want of the necessaries of life."

Friday last the remains of three persons, a woman named Harnett, and her daughter, and a person named Kiely, were interred in the burial ground at Monegea, within two miles of Newcastle, in one grave, and without coffins, in their old tattered garments! These parties died on the lands of Glenmore.

On Monday Honora Nolan, a wretched emaciated creature, with her 3 children, were lodged in Newcastle bridewell, charged with stealing turnips in the neighbourhood of Abbeyfeale; she was scarcely in confinement when she complained of illness, and after a short struggle expired. There were three other deaths awaiting an inquest in Mahoonagh, Abbeyfeale, and Rouska, in the Newcastle union; but in consequence of the coroner not arriving they were interred without an investigation.

In the last week Mr. Whitstone, Coroner, of Ennis, held inquests on John Gannon, near Toona. Verdict, death from destitution and cold; and upon Bridget M'Inerney, of Crusheen. Verdict death from cold and destitution.
