Friday an inquest was held at Rathkeale by Dr. Enright, coroner, on the body of Thomas Walsh, of Stoakesfield, near Shanagolden, who after returning from the fair of Rathkeale and transacting business for Thomas E. Davenport, Esq. in whose employment he was, partook of dinner with his family, and retired to bed. He was a corpse before morning! Decased was bro- ther to the late Mr. Nicholas Walsh, of Arthur's quay.

Wednesday night the police of the Kilmacow station arrested John Lyons, of Ballymakeymore, near Croom, a farmer holding fifty acres of land, who is charged with attacking the house of Thomas Naughton, appearing in arms, and taking away a quantity of flour.

On Monday night four sheep, the property of John Quain, of Manister, near Croom, were killed by a vagrant who gives his name as Griffin, and who was seen prowling about the neighbourhood for days pre- vious. He was detected by Quain and his family in the act of killing the sheep, four breeding ewes.

On Wednesday night Constable Alfred, of Rath- keale, arrested a woman named Casey, with a bag on her back which contained eight dead geese, stolen the night previous from John Sexton, caretaker to the Knight of Glin. On Friday night the above Constable succeeded in tracing a cow which had been stolen from Ballyhabill, and driven to the hill of Knockfierna. A woman named Ellen Costelloe who is arrested, has declared herself the thief.

Thomas Cullen was arrested in the railway train, near Maryborough, whilst on his way to Dublin, on a charge of having been concerned in the barbarous murder of Mrs. Catherine Fitzpatrick, of Coolcashin. Cullen was a kind of agent and manager for Mrs. Fitzpatrick, and had effected an insurance on her life for £450, with the Patriotic Company. He visited Mrs. Fitzpatrick at her house the evening before the murder, and on the night of the tragic occurrence was seen in close proximity to the scene. The prisoner is lodged in Kilkenny gaol.
