

two miles from Cahirconlish; they beat him in a dreadful manner, inflicting several cuts on his head; one of the men was armed with a pistol, which he broke upon Fitzgerald's head. Noble Seward, Esq., M.D., dressed and examined his wounds; he has stated that the skull is fractured, and that his life is in danger. The outrage was reported at Cahirconlish police barrack, on Sunday morning, before daylight, when Head-Constable Corbett, with Constable Moran and party, proceeded in pursuit of the offenders, two of whom they succeeded in arresting. The Head-Constable and party on returning to Cahirconlish, met a man who stated his name to be William Hogan, driving two sheep towards Tipperary, Head-Constable Corbett took him into custody, and Hogan then stated that he drove the sheep off some field convenient to Limerick.

About seven o'clock on Saturday evening, as the Widow Sheahan, of Belview, was returning home from the market of Limerick, she was met on the road between Croom and Cherrygrove Cross, by two men with their faces blackened, and armed with bayonets, who robbed her of 2 cwt. of flour, and a pair of new blankets, which she purchased same day. They also made an effort to rob her of her cloak, and in the attempt inflicted two bayonet wounds on her person, one in the chest, and another in the arm.

On Tuesday night, an armed party attacked several houses in the vicinity of Charleville, and took from a farmer named Scanlan, at Effin, promissory notes to the amount of £23, which they were to leave at a certain house, provided the impost of £1 would be left for them to buy powder and shot; and on the following evening they visited several houses in the neighbourhood of Fort, Foxhall and Cregane, in this county, and at last were repulsed by the inmates of the widow Brinn's house when attacking it; and one of the gang named Florence Connell was captured, who was well armed with a gun, loaded with blasting powder and slugs. Sub-Inspector Curling, of Charleville, with Head Constable Coe and party, proceeded to the widow's house and arrested Connell, and subsequently after a diligent search captured two brothers of name of Nunan, in whose possession they found the promissory notes taken from Scanlan and some powder. Scanlan has fully identified the three. By the arrest of those fellows the neighbourhood is rid of very bad characters.

John and Michael Fitzgerald (father and son,) caretakers to Joseph Gubbins, Esq. at a farm near Bruff have been committed to the county gaol, on the warrant of Charles Bennett, Esq. coroner, for the homicide of a poor man named Thomas Hanly, who died on the 15th inst. from the effects of a severe beating inflicted by the prisoners, who detected him in a field stealing their master's turnips. The unfortunate man being in great destitution, was prompted by necessity to the commission of the robbery.

Thursday night four armed men attacked the dwelling of Ellen Curran, of Corcomahide, and robbed her of 10s. and a quantity of wearing apparel.

Friday last, as James and Jeremiah Enright, carriers, were proceeding from Askeaton mills with two loads of Indian meal for the relief depot at Kilmeedy, they were attacked at Glenwilliam cross by a party of about 20 men, who plundered four sacks of meal.
