

Sir Wm. Somerville has brought in three bills to protect Justices of the Peace from vexatious actions in the execution of their office ; to facilitate the performance of the duties of Justices out of quarter sessions, with respect to summary convictions and orders ; and a similar bill with respect to persons charged with indictable offences.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer has directed the Attorney-General to try the legal question of the liability of the trustees of Cuffe-street Savings' Bank, Dublin, to the demands of the depositors, and for the delivery of the bank books.

Mr. Berwick, Assistant Barrister of the County Waterford, declares that Sir H. W. Barron, M.P. never consulted him about the new Bill for trial of offences in Ireland, which the House of Commons last week summarily threw out.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has appointed George Tomkins, Esq., of Caw House, late of this city, to the commission of the peace for Londonderry.

Complaints having been made to the Commissioners empowered to carry out the new Fishery law, of the number of persons engaged taking eel-fry in the river Shannon, and at the quays, in this city, yesterday the Mayor, who ordered the Police to arrest and prosecute all offenders transgressing.

A diabolical attempt was made on Saturday to upset the mail train of the Great Southern and Western near Templemore, which the precaution of the drivers fortunately frustrated, after two of the iron guards of the engine wheels had broken.

Mr. James Brown, master of the Hannah Grayson, of Workington, died in hospital yesterday evening of cholera, after 24 hours illness.

Michael Collopy, gardener of the late Godfrey Boyan, died of cholera, at Singland, on Sunday.

This morning 63 cholera patients were received at Barrington's hospital, the deaths being 22. Several cases occurred in the city since our last, but not fatal.
