## THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

SATURDAY EVENING, MARCH 17.

Lord John Russell proposes to take the second reading of the Rate in Aid Bill on the 26th inst.

Daniel Maunsell, Esq. has registered a £50 rent charge at the assizes of this county for the county of the city of Dublin.

At the Waterford record Court, Mrs. Eliza Pope obtained a verdict for £543 against Josiah Williams upon a partnership bond. In Jackson, v. Forristal, an action by a shipbroker against a shipowner, for agency in procuring freights, there was a verdict for £52. In Ruck, v. Brownrigg, for breach of contract in not delivering butter according to quality, there was a verdict for plaintiff of £55.

William Doyle and Edward Sheafey, appearing in arms and attacking the police barrack at Portlaw, are sentenced at Waterford assizes, to 10 years' transportation.

Michael O'Neill, of Greenane, near Cahircionlish, a respectable farmer, who was attending the assizes, returned home on Tuesday evening, took suddenly ill of the cholera on Wednesday morning, and died of the malady in a few hours after.

Josiah Bates, Esq., director of the Waterford and Kilkenny railway, has arrived in Kilkenny from the London Board, to purchase land, and push on the works to Knockwilliam. The construction of the Nore viaduct is to be proceeded with rapidly.

The result of the change made upon the Great Southern and Western railway, whereby impediments were thrown in the way of third class passengers, has been a diminution in the entire number of passengers, to the amount of 30,000 in the half-year.

Friday night a threatening letter was served on the postmaster of Littleton, Mr. J. Manning, to have nothing to do with Edward Maher's land.

Saturday night last, an entrance was effected through a window into the pantry at the Collegiate School in Birr, John's-place, and several legs of mutton, rounds, and prime roasting joints of beef stolen therefrom!
