Major Henry White, of Portsmouth, died in prison on Friday last. He entered the army in the year 1791, and served in the expedition under the late Duke of York in 1793, and at the end of the war in 1815; he was engaged in several actions with the enemy, was wounded four times, and at Vittoria severely. At his demise he had completed a period of service on full-pay of 58 years, and his army rank was only that of a Lieutenant!

John Davis, of the Royal Artillery, at which, for stabbing his wife with a bayonet, is committed for trial.

Twenty schools have been opened in and around London to educate aspirants for commissions in the army.

Number of those men recently discharged from the regiments have re-enlisted in the provisional on at Chatham. The 24th enlisted 140; each man, with their bounty money, will cost the Government between £7 and £8 per man.

Sergeant Major of the 38th is promoted to an ensign in that Regiment.

Improvements to the fortifications at Portsmouth are now finished, and sentries are placed along the whole line.

Captain Douglas and Ensign Parker, 16th Depot, Jersey, are to be tried by court-martial there for shooting a cow belonging to one of the inhabitants, and driving it over a cliff into the sea.

Lieut. Gibbon, R. H. A. in charge of the Artillery at Carlisle, and Acting Fort Adjutant, has been succeeded by Lieut. Page, of the Horse Brigade.

Sergeant Major John Wilson, 1st Royal, has been discharged, and recommended a free passage to Canada, where he will settle with his family.

Colonel Bird, of the East India Company's Service, died himself at Bath, on Thursday last. His wife had died before Christmas, and the separation had distressed his mind.

Captains Sir Burton Macnamara, and Lord George Bunsen (1833) have succeeded to the half pay list of £6d. per diem.

Capt. J. W. Hope Johnstone (1823), has been appointed to the *Agincourt*, as Commander of Devon-Ordinary, vice Mends, promoted.

Capt. Hayes, son of the late Admiral Hayes, the Governor of the *Inconstant*, denies that the Government, after the death of his father, paid £12,000 to his family for his plans, &c. He says—"That his family received any money from the Government, through all the drafts and plans of my late father have been placed in the hands of the Admiralty."

The *Warspite*, 50 guns, is to be brought forward in commission, to relieve the *Raleigh*, 50 guns, Commander Sir Thomas Herbert, south-east coast of Africa.

Mr. J. Chatham, Storekeeper, and Mr. Caffin, Deputy Storekeeper of Capt. Caffin, R.N., Laboratory Department, Woolwich, have received their full salaries, the former on £750, and the latter on £527 per annum.

Court-martial assembled on board her Majesty's *Impregnable*, at Devonport, on Monday, to try Commander Newland and the Officers of the *Magpie*, getting ashore at Porto Prayo, and thereby incurring the loss of that vessel.

The ship *Brutus*, Capt. Mitchell, from this port, was saved safe in Cadiz on the 10th instant. All on board well.

The Sidon steam frigate, Captain Henderson, from Gibraltar, has arrived at Portsmouth to be paid off.

Constable Thomas Corrigan, of Six-mile-bridge, has been promoted to Head-Constable, by Sir John M'Gregor, Inspector-General of Constabulary, an appointment which has given much satisfaction to the magistrates and gentlemen of the district. The Head-Constable has been stationed for the last sixteen years, during which period he has earned himself the respect and esteem of the community. The Cork City Constabulary are augmented from 110, with Sub-Inspector, and two Head-Constables.

Mr. Major, Assistant Barrister for Clare, will commence his Easter sessions circuit at Killaloe tomorrow. At Nenagh assizes Michael Finn, for maliciously striking the ear of John Connell, was sentenced to three years transportation; Patrick Collins, a pedlar, found guilty of bigamy; Daniel Lowry and Daniel M'Connell, for violation of Bridget Loughnane, to be transported for life; John Maher was convicted of the murder of Thomas Comerford, at Cabra, because the deceased had taken a farm of Mr. Fogarty, from which the prisoner had been evicted; Michael M'Connell, for robbery of £70 from Thomas Lester at Roscrea, to be transported for 7 years; Daniel Bridget Carroll, for stealing altar candlesticks from Newport chapel, were convicted; Michael M'Connell, for burglary, to be transported for the same term. At the last meeting of the Royal Irish Academy, the Archbishop of Dublin, the Provost and Vice Provost of Trinity College Dublin, and Dr. Anster, were appointed vice presidents.

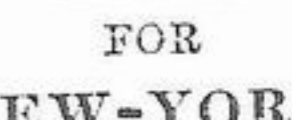

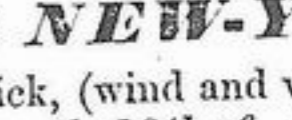
