The very benevolent friend to every good work in Ireland—who ordered £140 to be transferred to this object—had lately written to state that the condition on which that sum was originally granted for another charitable purpose some years since, and subsequently considered unattainable—having been just fulfilled, he could not, of course, insist upon the transfer, and hoped that the required aid would be sent thro' some other channel. On receiving that communication, the secretary wrote to a generous Lady who expressed a kind interest in the matter, and, he was thankful to report, that Miss Dumbleton—at all times a devoted friend to Ireland, especially since the commencement of its sore visitation—at once remitted £25 “to relieve his mind from a few grains of the load that pressed upon it.” He was, however, sure that the balance would be sent in due time, and that this, like every former trial, would only serve to exercise and strengthen faith, and redound to the glory of God, whose cause this is, and who can and will dispose some of His most honored agents to provide, in due time, this sum required on 17th inst. Examples were afforded on this, as on every other opportunity of strenuous local exertions.

The Countess Dunraven remitted from Adare and its immediate neighbourhood, £72 2s. 4d. collected from every class in that district; Kilfinane branch exceeded last year's efforts; the Rev. John Elmes handed in £16 5s. 7d., raised by his sons, Master Thomas Elmes card amounting to £5 4s. 5d., subscribed by the Artillery and 3d Buffs, quartered in this city, and Master John Blair Elmes collection, from friends and persons in business, was £11 1s. 2d.; Miss Franklin's card realised £2 2s.; and other friends shewed similar devotedness in the cause of truth and charity. And much need there is for the most energetic efforts.—Already has the pestilence deprived several little ones of all earthly means of support, in the removal of the parents on whom they entirely depended. But God delights not in the sufferings of his creatures. He only chastens them for their profit. Neither does He inflict a pang or impose a duty, which He will not turn to their salvation and the increase of their happiness, if they humble themselves in the affliction, trust in Him without wavering, and do all His will without a murmur. The continued and increased care of His children—the orphans—shown in their own deep affliction by all ranks and classes in this city and county, is a token for good. Already do streaks of light and joy appear on poor Ireland's horizon; and soon will that combination of circumstances unite for her deliverance, which will mark that deliverance to be clearly Providential and lead, it is humbly hoped, her people now and henceforward to give all the glory where only it is due.

By the death of Archbishop Crolly, who was interred at Armagh on Saturday, there is a vacancy in the Charitable Bequest and College Trusts.

At a meeting of the Sanatory committee of the city of Armagh, of which Archbishop Crolly was a member, a resolution, bearing testimony to the pure and exalted character of the Roman Catholic Prelate, was proposed by the Rev. Dr. Elrington, Rector of Armagh, and Regius Professor of Divinity in Trinity College, and unanimously adopted. At the time of his decease, Dr Crolly was in the 69th year of his age. Among the clergy of the Established Church, who attended his funeral were the Rev. Dr. Elrington, the Revds. Lord John Beresford, Irwin, Wade, &c. Ministers of the Presbyterian church also attended.

Rev. Mr. Casey, R. C. Curate of St. John's, who devoted himself during the late epidemic, with untiring zeal to the hospital and parochial duties, was seized with symptoms of cholera on Monday morning, and obliged to take to his bed. We are happy to announce that under prompt and able medical assistance, the Rev. gentleman is now convalescent.
