DEATH OF THE HON. AND RT. REV. EDMOND KNOX.

The Lord Bishop of Limerick died at Birmingham on Thursday night last, after a short illness, of inflammation on the lungs, induced by cold taken on his way to the See-house in this City, where the Rt. Rev. Prelate, though long suffering from ill health, with increase of years, was anxious to arrive; for the elevation of his nephew to the episcopal bench, and the consequent lapse of those important duties which he had so well exercised by commission, impressed upon the Bishop of Limerick an obligation he could not be persuaded to forego, that, of resuming in person the functions, and in the pious effort to accomplish this task, it may be said that the amiable prelate hastened his death, and fell a victim to his zeal. It is a remarkable coincidence that the Bishop of Limerick terminated his episcopal life upon the very day that the Bishop of Down was installed into the episcopal office, and may be said to have commenced his. The last moments of the deceased Prelate were consoled by the affectionate attention of his son, Archdeacon Knox, of Killaloe. His remains left Birmingham, on Monday morning for interment in the family vault at Rostrevor Church this evening, beside those of his departed wife, Charlotte, sister of the late Sir Thomas Heskett, Bart. a lady of refined manners and most virtuous disposition, whose loss had left an indelible impression upon the heart of her afflicted husband. The Bishop of Down, Archdeacon Knox, and James M'Mahon, Esq. Registrar of this diocese, in whom the late Bishop always reposed the greatest confidence, accompanied the funeral procession. His Lordship died in the 77th year of his age. Since the announcement of the melancholy event, the Cathedral bells of St. Mary's have been tolling a solem death peal in honor of the departed Prelate. His Lordship was youngest son of the late Viscount Northland, brother of the late Bishop of Derry, and uncle to the present Earl of Ranfurly. Dr. Knox, when Dean of Down, was elevated to the episcopal bench in September, 1831, and translated from the Bishopric of Killaloe to that of Limerick, at the demise of Dr. Jebb, in December, 1833. His Lordship was celebrated for pulpit eloquence of the most persuasive and affecting order, combined with energy and tenderness, which made his appeal to the feelings of a flock almost irresistible. At all times and occasions accessible to the humblest of his flock, no petitioner for relief or consolation, of whatever communion, ever left his presence without feeling the comfort and expressing the gratitude due to a friend and benefactor. The Bishop of Limerick enjoyed the almost singular felicity of uniting the dignity corresponding to his rank with the most engaging courtesy and gentleness of manners. The extent of his private charities is incalculable, for as the widow and orphan never appealed to his lordship in vain, his generosity in such cases was liberal, perhaps to a fault, but the intentions were unquestionably of the purest nature, and honourable to the pious and benevolent donor, whose memory will be long cherished by numerous recipients of his bounty.

The interior of the Cathedral is being hung in mourning for the deceased prelate, by order of the Very Rev. the Dean, who, it is the earnestly expressed wish of the clergy and laity of the diocese will succeed to the vacant see of Limerick.
