

nothing "from such information as he has procured" and on which he pins his belief—and the labours of the proprietors above the bridge in clearing and lowering the bed of the river &c. he must surely be aware that such simultaneous works would be useless, and be attended with ruinous and unnecessary expence, unless the Shannon Commissioners first lower the weir at Curraghower mill, so as to set off the water between tides, that the operations above the mill may be carried on with ease and safety, and at comparatively trifling cost as well as with certainty, by the ports being brought to view.

Surely these gentlemen cannot have consulted their Draining Engineer on the last operation for lowering and draining the upper Shannon, when they require all the works above the mill and weir at Curraghower to be completed; and they will then see how they will act respecting the mill and weir. I need not analyse this new system in the art of draining, as its effects must be such that no one can be deceived as to its merits, nor should I have mentioned it, but for the manner in which it has been connected with my work of Thomond Bridge.

The High Sheriffs of the county and city Limerick will swear in the Grand Juries, the former on Saturday the 7th, the latter on Monday the 9th of July.
