The continued heavy falls of rain, though relieved  
by occasional sultry heat, begin to excite some uneasi-  
ness in the mind of the farmer. Wheat is pros-  
trated in many places.

Two bridges were swept away at Cloghan, King's  
County, by the violent floods from heavy rain.

To the recent violent thunder and lightning showers  
do we attribute the partial discoloration of the leaf and  
stalk of the Potato crop.

Mr. John Moor, of this city, on Thursday last cut  
down a field of five acres of Wheat at Mungret,  
showing a very fine and well filled grain.

New oatmeal was ground at Blackpool mill, Cork,  
on Saturday.

There is some complaint of the appearance of the  
potato blight in the neighbourhood of Newcastle, but  
as yet it is very partial.

Potatoes are selling in Castlebar market at 4d. per  
stone, perfectly sound and well-grown.

On Thursday evening, Michael Grace, whilst  
unloading one of the luggage vans at the Tipperary  
terminus of the Limerick and Waterford Railway,  
accidentally fell on the rail, when the wheel passed  
over his knee, tearing off the covering, and laying open  
the joint. He was conveyed on the following morning  
to Barringtons' Hospital, where he now lies in a very  
dangerous way. During the past month, twelve  
hundred accidents have been attended to, and had sur-  
gical appliances in this most useful institution to the  
poor of this city, considerably outnumbering any for-  
mer return since the foundation of the hospital.

In Carmichael v. Waterford and Limerick railway  
company, there was a verdict for defendants at Cork  
assizes. The verdict had been for plaintiff at the  
preceding assizes. In Fitten v. O'Leary, an action  
for breach of promise of marriage, a verdict was en-  
tered by consent of defendant for £1000 damages.

The Cork and Bandon railway company have de-  
clared 343 shares forfeit, upon which £3587 had been  
paid.

Mary-Anne Thompson, nymph of the pave, in the  
act of shaking hands from the quay, last evening, with  
one of the crew of the ship *Lowell*, fell into the river,  
and was drowned. On being taken up, she was brought  
to Barringtons' Hospital, when means were resorted  
to reanimate her, but life was extinct long before she  
reached there.

A lad about 12 years of age, nephew of Mr. John  
Hendrick, Old George's-st., Cork, fell into the river  
Lee and was drowned, on Wednesday.

The *Ariel* has cleared out at Kilrush with 80 pas-  
sengers for Quebec.

Mr. Francis Hennis, of Gurrane, is appointed High  
Constable of the barony of Cork, vice Mr. J. Roberts,  
resigned.

Mr. Marshall, sold by auction yesterday, at Mr. John  
White's office, Thomas-street, 60 hogsheads Barbadoes  
sugars, which realised from 36s. 6d. to 40s. per cwt.  
He also sold elsewhere a quantity of heavy mess pork  
by auction, which averaged £3 3s. per barrel of  
standing.
