

a more peaceable state. This auxiliary imposed an additional tax upon the county of Limerick, and in the present distressed state of the country he did not think they ought to be put to a tax of unnecessary expense. The usual force to them (400 men) was quite sufficient to fulfil the duty which would be required in the event of rebellion, therefore, he thought they ought to be employed with his Excellency on the subject, and to re-consider the matter.

The magistrates present, among whom were Mr. Whitty, Mr. Bindon Blood, and Mr. O'Donnell, thought it would be judicious to remove a number of men at the present time from the force on the eve of the harvest, and at a period when relief would be almost totally stopped by various unions, and it was to be feared there would be an increase of crime which would render this necessary. Archdeacon Whitty remarked that what deal to do as a magistrate, he did not know; in his district they had a single policeman.

General observed that those who did not require additional force could be dispensed with, in the memorial.

The memorial was then read to the meeting by Mr. O'Donnell, and was subsequently signed by a large number of the magistrates present.

In petty sessions, on Wednesday, a car driver was prosecuted by a gentleman for driving on the road from Kilrush last Saturday evening to do so against all remonstration, and another passenger car into a dyke on the road. The magistrates fined the offender 10s. imprisonment, and complimented the gentleman who brought the fellow before the bench, and to others.

The County Sheriff evicted forty families off a farm at Killoscully, on Wednesday. The property belonged to Mr. Crozier Molony, but is now in the hands of a Master in Chancery.
