Excellent potatoes, of large size, and perfectly sound,
are this day selling in our market at 4d. per stone.

We have letters this morning from the West of the
County Clare—various parts of the counties Tippe-
rary, Cork and Limerick, and all declare that the po-
tato is sound, tho' the stalk is discoloured. We are
therefore certain, that the failure is very limited.

Should Providence vouchsafe to bless the growing
potato crop of Ireland, this year, comfort and hap-
piness will again alleviate the fallen condition of our
impoverished and famine stricken population, and the
workhouses of the country will be deserted by inmates.
Already hundreds are taking their discharge from such
institutions, even in this City, over 600 having left
within the last fortnight.

Upwards of forty Magistrates attended at Ennis on
Monday, Bindon Blood, Esq., in the chair, when Mr.
Austin Moran was elected High Constable for Burren;
Fitzgerald Blood for both baronies of Bunratty; Mr.
James O'Grady for Lower Tulla; and the remaining
Constables were re-elected. All refused at the last
assizes to take out their warrants of collection, and it
is only by the alteration of the law that induced them
to re-assume their onerous office. A proposition to
dispense with the extraordinary Constabulary was car-
ried by a small majority, but a resolution was adopted
to continue the force until next assizes.

All the Baronies of the county Clare are now pro-
vided with collectors, except Upper Tulla.

At Cork Assizes, Timothy Rahilly, John Coghlan,
Michael Leary, and a young boy named Reidy, charged
with the wilful murder of John Tuomy, a shoemaker,
were found guilty of manslaughter, and sentenced to
two years' imprisonment.

The body of Catherine Dillon, executed in front of
the County Gaol on Saturday last, for conspiracy to
murder her husband, after being taken down from the
drop, was given to her friends, who had provided an
excellent coffin for her interment. The mother, bro-
thers, sisters, and children of the ill-fated woman were
congregated before the prison, and witnesses of the
awful spectacle. Her remains were conveyed to her
late residence at Cappamore, where she was waked
that night, and the interment, which took place next
day, was attended by hundreds.

The dreadful thunder storm of last Wednesday and
Thursday appears to have been general throughout
the kingdom, as accounts from all quarters record dis-
astrous effects; rain fell in torrents, flooding many
towns and villages, and sweeping away crops and
cabins, while the electric fluid displayed its tremendous
power by striking many dead.

A great loss has been sustained by a number of far-
mers near Killaloe, owing to the disastrous effects pro-
duced by the mountain floods, or rather water spouts,
which burst on the mountain tops, the respective pro-
perties of Colonel George Wyndham and Mr. Marcus
Patterson.

A few nights since, while his family were asleep, the
