

"malice cannot be imputed to a Company, inasmuch as a Company is a corporate body—a corporate body has no soul—malice is an emotion of the soul. Therefore, to find malice here would be to find malice against a body without soul." A parody this upon an old and vulgar adage, which, even as a joke, is reprehensible enough in a grave court of justice, but which, as the occasion of an obvious misfinding, is altogether an outrage upon truth and decency. Directors may have malice—solicitors may have malice (and it is curious that, in this case, the expenses of proceedings against Mr. CARMICHAEL have been guaranteed by the Solicitors); but because collectively these individuals are understood to have no conscience—because their individual responsibility becomes infinitely diminished in a collective injustice—are they to be held irresponsible in the eye of the law? Besides, if a claim cannot be established against a company for false imprisonment, how was it that a company, "without a soul," claimed the right of imprisoning? If they are invulnerable as defendants, how are they entitled to proceed as plaintiffs? Perhaps, to carry the joke still further, the judge here should have recalled the old story of the man in the stocks who was assured by a lawyer on that, in a free country it was absolutely impossible that such a punishment could be inflicted for his so trivial offence. "Impossible, but I am in the stocks!" Not at all, is the reply; such a thing could not take place in a country pretending to civilization. The glaring fact is ignored, because it is in contradiction to a fallacious theory, and the judge ought to have told Mr. Carmichael that his imprisonment was a mere delusion, as it was quite impossible for a body without a soul to have put a soul and body in limbo. We recommend Mr. Carmichael not to abate a jot of his rightful claim—to move forthwith for a new trial, and to carry his case, if need be, into the supreme house of the legislature—*Railway Record.*

LABOUR UNION.—The Earl of Clare presided this day at the weekly meeting of the guardians. Mr. Collier gave notice of motion that all goods required for the workhouse should be of Irish produce. The Rev. Mr. Moore appeared before the board to claim a reduction in the rating of land belonging to his father near Groody Pike, which had been deteriorated in value in consequence of some houses on the property having been levelled. The board regretted they could not give the rev. gentleman redress. It was resolved that proceedings be taken against Mr. Barry, late rate-collector and his securities for the amount of rate uncollected by him. A resolution was adopted that all contractors shall be paid monthly; there is £1,000 in bank to the credit of the union, and by the 1st of October it is expected the guardians will have sufficient funds to meet all liabilities. Number of paupers in the workhouse, 3,690; discharged during the week, 340; admitted, 57; died, 23.
