DEATH OF LIEUTENANT-COLONEL MAUNSELL.

With much regret do we announce the demise yesterday at his house, George's-street, of Lieut.-Colonel George Maunsell, who for several years commanded the 3d or Prince of Wales' Dragoon Guards, and served with great distinction in that Regt., and the Peninsula from April, 1809 to the end of the war in 1814, including the battles of Talavera, the winter campaign of 1810 in the lines of Lisbon; actions of Campo Mayor and Los Santos; battles of Busaco and Albuera; action of Usagre; sieges of Ciudad Rodrigo and Badajos; battles of Vittoria and Toulouse. He commanded a squadron at the brilliant cavalry affair of Usagre, when three French Regts. were defeated by the 3d Dragoon Guards. He retired on half pay unattached in 1843, but like his old and gallant brother officer in arms, Col. Stawell, 12th Lancers, he declined retiring from the service. Society has lost in Col. Maunsell a gentleman of refinement, amiability, and suavity of manners. To his immediate family his loss is irreparable, as he was endeared to them by every tie of kindred, feeling and affection. Lt.-Col. Maunsell had medals for Talavera, Albuera, Vittoria, and Toulouse. His remains will be interred on Friday next in the family vault at St. John's Church.

Major G. E. Turner, Royal Artillery, Master of the Horse to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, died of cholera, on Sunday last, after three hours illness. Major Turner attended divine service on Sunday, in apparent good health, and immediately after, was attacked by cholera, which terminated so fatally. He was son of Major-General Turner, commanding the Commanding the Cork district, and Private Secretary to Lord Clarendon, when Charge de-Affaires at Madrid, for his ability in which department the gallant young officer obtained the Brevet rank of Major, the 9th May, 1845. Major Turner was attached to a troop of the Horse Brigade in this garrison, when Col. Cator, R.A. commanded. He died at the Viceregal Lodge on Sunday, and was buried next day at Castlenock.

On the 15th August the Canadian Government arrested several parties implicated in the riots and burning of the Parliament House at Montreal; among others, Mr. Ewing, and Mr. Courtney. In the evening a mob attacked the house of Lafontaine, the Minister. The military, who had been in the house for his protection, fired thirty shots, and killed a man named Mason. Some barricades were then erected which the soldiers demolished, and the rioters then dispersed. Mason's funeral was attended by large numbers—the coffin was dressed in red. Donegana's Hotel, in Montreal, a magnificent establishment, has been totally burned down.
