THE MURDERS AT LIVERPOOL.

EXECUTION OF GLEESON WILSON.—Saturday last at
one P.M., Calcraft, the executioner, terminated the
existence of the wretched culprit J. Gleeson Wilson,
of Bruree, County Limerick, on the scaffold at Kirk-
dale Goal, in the presence of the largest concourse of
spectators that has probably ever been collected at
Liverpool on a similar occasion. The miserable man's
crimes were of the most appalling character; their
equal in revolting atrocity, possibly, is not to be found
in the annals of such barbarous acts. By introducing
himself into the dwelling of Capt. Hinrichson as a tra-
veller, he, for no other apparent purpose than plunder,
succeeded in savagely murdering Mrs. Ann Hinrichson,
her two sons, Henry George and John Alfred, and the
fourth victim, Mary Parr, the servant, by cutting their
throats, beating in their skulls, and otherwise fright-
fully mutilating them. For these atrocities he was
tried at the last assizes, and left for death by Mr.
Justice Patteson. The public may be aware that
Capt. Hinrichson, the deceased's husband, has only
within the last week returned to England from a
voyage to Calcutta. Never has a convict under sen-
tence of death exhibited such an amount of callousness
as Wilson, notwithstanding the exhortations of Rev.
Mr. Duggin, a Roman Catholic minister, who has
been in daily, almost hourly, attendance upon him.
An impression has been entertained that Captain Hin-
richson confronted the culprit in the course of yester-
day, the bereaved captain having expressed a desire to
see him. Such, however, is not the case. Twelve
o'clock this day was the time appointed for carrying
the dread sentence into effect, when there could not
have been less than 30,000 persons collected. A few
minutes after twelve Wilson was led forth to the
drop. He appeared remarkably firm, and while the
preliminaries were being arranged not a muscle in his
frame was seen to move. Scarcely three minutes
elapsed ere the bolt was drawn, and the wretched man
died after a few but severe struggles. He protested
his innocence to the last!
