

On Monday next an election, to commence at 10 and end at 3, will take place at the Parish Office for a Commissioner of St. Michael's, in this city.

Mr. Halpin, Surveyor to the Ballast Board, has been visiting the Beeves Rock, on which a magnificent Light-house is erecting by Mr. Burgess and his son. The work is most superior, and the execution permanent. The operations are highly approved of by Mr. Halpin. The entire structure, when completed, will cost £5,000, a sum most properly expended, as the house will be a prominent beacon for vessels sailing up and down the noble Shannon.

It is now fixed that the line by railway from Dublin to Limerick to the city of Cork will be opened on the 29th instant, on which day the mails, English and Dublin, will be conveyed by steam.

MYSTERIOUS MURDER AT MURROE.—On Monday last, Sub-Inspector Heard, of Castle-Connell, succeeded in bringing to light as mysterious and unnatural a murder as was ever perpetrated in this county. The alleged murderer was brother to the innocent victim whose life he took away through lucre, for the purpose of possessing himself of a small fortune, not more than £50, bequeathed by his father, to the sister, a girl aged only 12 years. About two years since, this foul deed was perpetrated at Murroe, by a man named James Healy. Soon after the girl being missed from home, suspicion attached to her brother, who was arrested twice, but at the time no proof could be had to warrant his being brought to justice. "Murder cries to Heaven for vengeance," and in this case the will of the Almighty has been manifest in corroboration of the truth of the proverb. A quarrel having arisen between families of Healy and Browe, led to the discovery of the foul deed—One accused the other of "evil deeds, and wicked acts," until the mystery was disclosed—the Police were called upon, and in a quarry discovered the remains (only bones) of the murdered girl, where they had been deposited at the period the atrocious murder was perpetrated. James Healy was immediately arrested, and the circumstantial evidence that will be adduced against him is deemed sufficient to lead to his prosecution at next assizes.
