CORONER'S INQUEST NEAR CRATLOE.

On Thursday John Molony, Esq. coroner, held an inquest at the police barrack, Meelick, near Cratloe Castle, on the body of Patk. Londrigan, of Garryheckin, parish of Oulah, county Limerick. Sub-Inspector Williams, of this city, attended the inquisition.

It will be in the recollection of our readers that deceased, who came into Limerick on Friday, the 19th October, to make sale of corn, had been ever since missing, without any clue to his discovery.

The jury having been sworn, proceeded to view the body, which was in a state of decomposition, while the features were scarcely discernible, being much discoloured and swollen.

Michael Bourke, a young man who was in company with the deceased, on being sworn, deposed that they dined together in Limerick on the evening of Friday, the 19th October; after dinner they walked thro' the city, and drank two half glasses of punch at a public house opposite the potato market, kept by a man named Maloney; while there deceased picked up with an improper female, who said her name was Mary Menger; deceased left Malony's in company with the girl; they went down the bowway near Fitt's brewery, (the river adjoins the brewery); after deceased parted the female, witness and he went in the direction of the Irishtown, and drank at Scott's tavern; Bourke then detailed other matters relating to their night's debauchery, and concluded by saying that himself and deceased fell in a second time with improper women, with whom they were in company near Fitt's brewery, where Londregan first went with Mary Menger; a dispute arose between deceased and the girls, respecting money which fell from him; witness interfered; the watch were called, and he (Bourke) was taken to the police barrack; deceased was not taken into custody; witness never saw him after; is sure the body exhibited to day is that of Patrick Londregan.

John Halloran, boatman, sworn—Between 2 and 3 o'clock yesterday I found the body now identified as that of Patrick Londregan, in the marsh at Meelick, near the brink of the Shannon; it was washed in by the tide.

Sutgeon Thomas Molony, who made a *post mortem* examination, described the state of the body; there was a cut on the forehead, at the right side of the head; the legs were lacerated; thinks the wounds were inflicted while deceased was living; they might have been contracted while struggling in the water, or have been occasioned by falling into the river.

The Coroner said as there was no further evidence, the jury could only return a verdict of "Found drowned," which they did.
