reside, and having been a strolling beggar, there can be  
no doubt but that she died of utter destitution, and  
want of the necessaries of life. The police had the body  
removed to an adjacent house, where her clothes were  
searched, and six sovereigns and 15s. were found  
stiched in her old gown, immediately under her left  
arm! On the same day an inquest was held on the  
body, and a verdict returned—Died of starvation.
