CORK INSOLVENT COURT.—Dr. Robert Newman
Lowe was opposed by Counsellor Walsh, who applied
for a further postponement of the case. The court ob-
served that the Insolvent was first arrested in 1847 for
the sum of £200, on a verdict obtained against him
for seduction. The poor woman had lost her cha-
racter, and was burdened with the support of an un-
fortunate child, but her seducer was unwilling to make
any amends for his conduct. He had been permitted
to stand out on bail; but did not avail himself of the
liberty. He, a professional man, offered one shilling
for the maintenance of the wretched woman and her
infant! The judgment of the court was that the In-
solvent should be imprisoned for two years until he
settled with the father of the woman whom he he had
seduced. Edmond Burke and John Fitzmaurice
Burke (sons of Col. Burke), in custody at the suit of
Dyde, Joel and others, for trinkets, jewellery, &c.,
were discharged.
