The Guardians devoted last Wed-
nesday to the circumstances of the death
of Anne Flanagan, who died near the Work-
house, on the 12th inst.; an inquest was
held on the 14th, and the verdict of the
jury attributed the man's death to cold and
neglect of the relieving officer (Henry
Esq.) of duty. Subsequently Mr. Pat
Esq., of the Guardians, and uncle to the re-
lieving officer, repudiated the truth of the verdict,
and rested upon the master of the
workhouse after hearing the evidence
of Anne Flanagan, wife of deceased,
Clerk of the Union, Mr. O'Brien,
of the Workhouse, Dr. Hehir, and some of the
members of the Guardians, came to a resolution,
of opinion that nothing has trans-
pired in attributing the death of
the deceased to any wilful or culpable neglect on the
part of the relieving officers.

There are now at the suit of contractors
