The tower of Fermoy church is being raised.
 The late Samuel Caswell, Esq., whose remains were

 The Synod of Dublin, in connexion with the Gene-
 ral Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland,
 will hold its next annual meeting in Mary's-abbey,
 Dublin, on Tuesday, the 14th inst.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Ryan will hold annual conference
 with his Clergy in this City at St. Michael's Chapel on
 the 3d inst., at Rathkeale, the 7th, at Newcastle the
 8th and Bruff the 14th inst.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Ryan, adverting on Sunday last
 to the much regretted death of the Rev. Mr. D'Arcy,
 P. P. of Mungret, on whose amiable character
 the venerated Prelate bestowed a handsome
 eulogium, said, that now, after 24 years of his pasto-
 ral charge of the Limerick diocese, he had observed
 not less than *one hundred* of his clergy, taken from
 their arduous mission in this life, by the hand of death,
 to receive, he hoped, the reward of their labours in the
 everlasting kingdom of their divine master.

At five o'clock on Tuesday morning, the remains of
 the late Rev. Patrick D'Arcy, P.P., were removed from
 the residence of Dr. O'Shaughnessy, George's-street,
 to St. Michael's chapel, where the Roman Catholic
 clergy of the diocese, with their Bishop, assembled;
 and office and high mass was celebrated for the de-
 ceased clergyman. At the conclusion of the reli-
 gious obsequies, the coffin was transferred to the hearse
 and the funeral cavalcade formed, the streets through
 which the mournful procession moved being densely
 thronged. A large body of gentry, with the Mayor,
 acted as chief mourners; the congregated trades, St.
 Michael's temperance society, parishioners of Mungret
 and Loughmore, &c., with scarfs and hat-bands, mar-
 ched in order, being closed by a line of carriages, (in-
 cluding those of the Lord Bishop, and William Mon-
 sell, Esq., M.P., the Mayor, &c.) and private vehicles.
 Previous to the body being consigned to its last rest-
 ing place, in the parish chapel of Mungret, the ser-
 vice for the dead was read by the Rt. Rev. Dr. Ryan.
