The Very Rev. THOMAS O'BRIEN COSTELLOE, V.G., P.P., Abington and Murroe, on Monday last, at Castle Comfort, his residence, near Murroe. An illness of brief duration, and which did not excite alarm among his immediate friends till Saturday, prostrated his energies and terminated his mortal existence, at a venerable old age, amid the heartfelt regrets of those whom in life had had ample means of experiencing the noble qualities for which he was conspicuous among the Roman Catholic clergy of Munster. Dr. Costelloe was for thirty-six years pastor of the united parishes of Abington and Murroe, in the archdiocese of Cashel, of which he was Vicar-General, and he was Precentor of the Chapter of Emly. Deeply respected, and sincerely venerated by his own flock, he likewise won and preserved the esteem and admiration of a most extensive circle of friends and acquaintances throughout Tipperary and Limerick, and in many other parts of Ireland. He was the friend of all the Protestant Clergymen and Dignitaries who held the important living of Abington during the long series of years he filled the office of Roman Catholic pastor of that union. With the late Dr. Jebb, Lord Bishop of Limerick, when Rector of Abington, he was on the most cordial terms; and the good feeling that subsisted between them was unchanged while Dr. Jebb wore the mitre and till death closed his career. His charity to the poor partook of the same noble traits that distinguished every other virtue that adorned his generous nature; it was uncalculating and unlimited; and the loss which the destitute who surrounded him sustain, cannot be repaired. In the county Limerick he long occupied a prominent political place; he was Secretary of the County Liberal Club. His sympathies were as enlarged as his hospitalities were proverbial; and to the earnest zeal of the minister of the gospel he united the sterling attributes of the citizen and the patriot, fearless and uncompromising in the discharge of all his public duties. Than the Very Rev. Dr. Costelloe, O'Connell never had a warmer friend or a more uncompromising advocate. It was he that reconciled O'Connell and Smith O'Brien after the differences that arose between them on the subject of attendance to the Speaker's call in the House of Commons in 1845. He was the father of the flock, of whose temporal as well of whose spiritual interests he was ever the indefatigable guardian; and the gloom and desolation which they experience in consequence of their bereavement is the best proof that can be afforded of the strong hold he had on the best affections—of those who can best estimate the value of such a man among them. The Very Rev. gentleman was nearly fifty years a resident in the parish of which he was pastor—having succeeded his uncle, the late Very Rev. Dr. O'Brien, whose curate he had been for some years.—*Tipperary Vindicator.*
