Monday night a deadly conflict arose at Greenhills, near Roxboro, upon the occasion of giving possession of a farm under the courts, to a man named Michael Hogan, by the keepers, men of the name of Scanlan, who were struck with stones, knocked down, and left apparently for dead. One of the men, a peacemaker, Edward Brien, was killed on the spot. No shot was fired, but the slaughter was effected by stone throwing, and blows inflicted by stone in hand.

The Tenant right meeting at Bruff, on Sunday, was the first held in this County since the agitation of this question commenced, and indicated the indifference and apathy of the farming and agricultural classes—even the resident clergymen—as to the success of the measure.
