In the discharge of his public duties for a series of years, no gentleman holding the commission of the peace could display more personal energy and constitutional temper, whenever the welfare of his fellow-citizens was concerned; and there were critical occasions of political and local excitement in which his active influence produced the happy effect of appeasing hostile parties and subduing great popular commotion, without actual violence. Prompt and decisive when riot and outrage prevailed, his forbearance and consideration were equally conspicuous: thus admirably blending the strict duties of a public officer with the natural benevolence and refined courtesy of a perfect gentleman-qualities for which he stood pre-eminently high in the estimation of every class of his fellow-citizens. It is almost superfluous to add that he lived in the esteem and regard of a large circle of friends, and died universally regretted. The remains of the late Alderman Crips were interred this morning in the family vault at Cahirnarry Church.
