A Kilrush correspondent writes:—"I think it right
to mention to you that there is not one word of truth
in the letter which appeared in a late number of a
Limerick newspaper, from one of the Kilrush Relieving
Officers, who stated that Benjamin Cox, Esq., gave
out-door relief to his own labourers as well as other
favourites. Mr. Cox had all the parties he was so
charged with before the board on Saturday, to con-
tradict the above statement, but Col. Vandeleur and Mr.
Briscoe thought it better not to press the investigation
pending an inquiry into the conduct of the auditor
towards him, which Mr. Cox thinks will reveal strange
things, and show that there was a decided intention
on the part of persons in power to obstruct the work-
ing of the present board at Kilrush, and this has been
proved before the late parliamentary enquiry."

A very audacious outrage occurred in the workhouse
of Kilrush on Tuesday last. A number of grown boys,
who were a long time in the house, and very trouble-
some of late, for their evil example was corrupting the
juniors, were ordered to be sent away by the Guardians.
The master, Mr. Pollen, had them assembled for that
purpose, and called Mr. Cox into the yard to witness
the matter, when all at once a most mutinous dispo-
sition was evinced, and a simultaneous attack made on
the master with sticks and stones. Fortunately for the
poor man Mr. Cox succeeded in taking several of the
sticks from them; however, he got knocked down
himself, and his neck was cut by a blow of a stone!
The ringleaders were eventually secured by the Police,
and informations taken against them.

house on Thursday.

The monthly horse auction at Hartigan's repository,
