THE LATE DR. GABBETT.

The venerable Cathedral of St. Mary's, whose antique massive proportions and quaint artistic features present such an air of solemn yet curious grandeur to all admiring strangers who visit the interior of this hallowed edifice, has recently given honorable place among "storied urn and animated bust" to a monument recording the private virtues of the late Dr. Robert Gabbett, of Limerick, which his surviving brothers have erected as an affectionate tribute to departed worth. The monument is entirely of Irish manufacture, and a model of chaste sculpture, inferior to no one of the other handsome memorials of late years set up in the Cathedral. The design is executed in white Italian marble, raised upon a black ground, and stands in the eastern transept of the vestibule or grand entrance. It represents a classic female figure, in graceful drapery, sad, yet not despondent—an emblem of Hope or Charity—her left arm resting upon the funeral urn, the head recumbent, and her right hand supported by the anchor of faith. The square tablet immediately under is of exquisitely polished virgin marble, with the following inscription in black Roman capitals, between two marble pilastres moulded in the happiest style of art, evidencing altogether a beautiful specimen of artistic skill, with enduring proof of fraternal love:—

"In the family vault, at Caherconlish, rest the mortal remains of Robert Maunsell Gabbett, Esq., M.D., of Shelburn House, who died 22d June, 1850, aged 37 years. This tablet, sacred to his memory, is placed here by his brothers, to record his amiable qualities as a man, his good example as a Christian, and their own deep sorrow for the early loss of one who was universally beloved and esteemed. 'Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace.'"

Beneath the inscription, is a small central shield or escutcheon of the armorial bearings of the Gabbett family, with the motto "parcere subjectis, debellare superbos."
