On Monday last, at the house of John Morris Russell, Esq. George-street, in the 59th year of his age, Joseph Gubbins, Esq. of Kilfrush, Deputy Lieutenant of this County, and amongst its resident gentry one of the most extensive practical Agriculturists as well as useful proprietors. The profound grief of his fondly attached family, (five daughters and four sons), who revered him as the best of parents, and the sincere regret of his highly respectable connexions and friends, will long attest the loss of this excellent gentleman. Mr. Gubbins, as we last week stated, was seized by a violent apoplectic affection while travelling by railway train, to attend the late county election; and the lamented subject of this obituary never spoke since the attack, though having the most skilful medical aid that our City possessed. His numerous tenantry and labourers will sustain a grievous loss by the unexpected death of their good landlord and constant employer—for Mr. Gubbins farmed a large tract of ground, to the great improvement of the district in which he was a resident proprietor and acknowledged benefactor. As a magistrate and grand juror, no gentleman exercised the important duties with more integrity, prudence, and discretion; while in the family circle, his life was a model of the domestic virtues, happy to contemplate, and henceforward consolatory to remember by those who loved him.
