Mary M'Carthy, of Old Clare-st. charged with the manslaughter of Catherine M'Inerny, who died from the effects of injuries inflicted with a poker, at West Watergate, six weeks since, surrendered herself to the Mayor, and has been committed to the City gaol.

At Nenagh Petty Sessions, informations were returned to Thurles Quarter Sessions, for having stolen clothes, against James Cleary, brother of the fellow who cut his own ears off, for the purpose of instituting a prosecution against innocent persons, but who has since been transported.

Mr. John H. Collins, solicitor, of Kilrush, has been committed by the Mayor to the city gaol, for obtaining a suit of clothes from a Policeman at Abbeyfeale, and refusing to return them. The owner sued for £1 16s 10d in the court of conscience, and obtained a decree.

Mr. Thomas Quill, Manager of the National Bank, Tralee, has received a complimentary address from the gentry and mercantile classes there, on his promotion to management of the Waterford branch.

James Guthrie, Esq., of the Provincial Bank, Belfast, has been promoted to the branch at Dungannon.

The tolls of the Turnpike-gates from Athlone to Kinnefad were put up at Kilbeggan, by the trustees, but in consequence of traffic on the line, no bidders appeared. The Athlone coach, on its way to Mullingar, laden with passengers, broke down on Thursday, outside Kilbeggan, and the passengers had to be conveyed on cars to the railway.

The Ceylon coffee crop for this season promises to be of very fine quality, and the shipments are large. The local revenue shows a balance in favor of the island of £62,580.

The Mayor of Kilkenny this week convicted the weighmaster of the Butter market, of calling out a false weight of butter, and pronounced the market a sink of iniquity.

Two women, named Fitzgerald and Hennessy, are committed to Cork gaol for the murder of a child, three months old, at Buttevant, on Saturday.

A large fleet of outward bound vessels have taken shelter at Tarbert, owing to the tempestuous state of the weather during the past month.

Eliza Tracy, a poor girl, aged 14 years, in service at Market-alley, fell asleep by the fire on Wednesday night, and was so severely burnt that she died next morning in Barrington's hospital.

At the Castle Connell petty sessions on Thursday last, Thomas Enright, John Carroll, and others, appeared on the summons of Patrick Hickey, water-bailiff for threatening language, and for obstructing him in the discharge of his duties. Mr. J. B. Alton, secretary to the Limerick Board of Conservators, appeared in support of the complaint, and Counsellor Watson for the defence. After legal arguments and the examination of witnesses, Enright and Carroll were bound in a penalty of £5 each to keep the peace to complainant. It transpired that the defendants hold warrants as Water Bailiffs under the Board of Conservators, and were until lately in receipt of pay as such.
