DREADFUL MURDER OF A FEMALE

Between six and seven o'clock yesterday morning, as Dr. Galston, accompanied by a friend, was proceeding along the banks of the canal, for the purpose of taking his accustomed bath in the Shannon, he observed the body of a female in the water, within a short distance of the Upper lock, and promptly called upon the lodge keeper, M'Namara, and had the unfortunate victim raised to the bank, when it was found she had been most barbarously murdered! The head was literally shattered to pieces, and the skull being broken and mangled, lay bare over the forehead. The wounds must have been inflicted by a ferocious murderer. In the lower part of her gown a heavy stone was tied up, and there can be little doubt, from the nature of the injuries, that they were effected with either a hatchet or a weighty sharp stone. The Police of George's-quay station, on receiving intelligence of the dreadful occurrence, at once proceeded to the locality, and had the body of the unfortunate woman removed to their barrack for recognition by the public, but no clue was had up to 3 o'clock yesterday as to who she was or from whence she came. Deceased looked to be about 45 years of age, and wore a blue cloth cloak, black stockings, and boots. The police and authorities are on the alert to reveal the particulars of this mysterious deed of blood, and it is hoped the dark deed will be brought to light.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.—This morning, at seven o'clock, a man named Michael Bourke, when passing the Police station at George's-quay, recognised the body of the ill-fated woman to be that of Mary Hanly, wife of a labourer, in the employ of Mr. Wm. Gubbins, provision merchant, John's-gate. Michael Hanly, her husband, was at once arrested by Constable Nash, in their house in John's-gate.

THE INQUEST.—William C. Murphy, Esq. Coroner, held an inquest at nine o'clock, on view of the body, and from the evidence it appeared that the husband was cohabiting with another female, and lived on bad terms with his wife, but sufficient information did not transpire to inculpate him in the murder, and the inquiry was therefore adjourned till Friday for further testimony. The man remains in custody.

Constable Nash arrested this morning in Johnsgate Mary Tuohy, the young woman with whom Hanly has been intimate, on whose apron and gown he distinctly found marks of blood. It is said that she and Hanly were preparing to sail for America, after the death of his wife.

On Saturday a cruel murder was committed by an old wretch of a woman on a young girl, between Tipperary and Carrick; it is supposed to obtain a half crown which the girl was entrusted with. Her throat was cut from ear to ear.

John Brown, a respectable farmer near Skull, county Cork, was waylaid and murdered on Monday morning.
