AGRICULTURAL IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY.—John M. Esq. D.L., presided this day at a numerous meeting of this body, which was held at the Limerick Institution. The high sheriff of the county was in attendance; also Robert Maxwell, Esq., and the Archdeacon Keatinge, &c. The Archdeacon stated that a communication had been received from the Lord Lieutenant, requesting his Excellency's approval of the establishment of an Agricultural Farm and School for this district, within one mile of the City, and sanctioning a sum of £4,500, to be the reproductive fund, for that purpose. It was also stated by the Archdeacon that Sir Richard Russell accompanied him and Mr. Russell in looking out for an eligible site, and they had come to the conclusion that the best was to be found in the vicinity of Mungret, a distance of two miles from the city. It was resolved to apply to the Lord Lieutenant for permission to purchase the land, if obtainable on reasonable terms. The result of "the Munster Fair" was warmly taken up, and the following Committee appointed to take the necessary steps for interesting the agriculturalists in the project—William Franklin, manager of the Provincial Bank; Robert Maxwell, Esq., George Veivers, Esq., John C. Delmege, Esq., John Long, Esq., Dr. Kane, Capt. Vandeleur, Archdeacon Keatinge. The meeting broke up at half past four.
