A verdict of manslaughter is returned against Mi-

Cormick, who died in consequence.

The house of Mr. McKernon, Poor-rate collector,  
Roscommon, was burned down a few nights ago.

The convicts in the city gaol under transportation  
will be removed in a few days.

Last night the habitation of Michael Kerly, at  
Newcastle, near this City, was fired by two unfortu-  
nate women named M'Namara, who afterwards walked  
to the next police station and reported their own in-  
cendiary act! Constable Hyland forthwith hastened  
to the scene, and seeing the roof in flames, roused up  
Kerly, his wife, and children, who had gone to sleep,  
and thus saved the innocent family from impending  
destruction. The two women shewed the box of  
matches by which they set the house in a blaze. They  
were this day fully committed to gaol.

Yesterday Dr. Murphy held an inquest a Barring-  
ton's hospital, on the body of Francis Griffin, the  
young boy who was killed by a jaunting car running  
over him the day previous at Merchant's-quay. The  
driver, John Gilbertson, stated he called out repeat-  
edly to the lad, but was unable to pull up in time to  
avert the calamity; but this circumstance, the Coroner  
said, was no excuse, and the jury returned a verdict of  
manslaughter against the driver. The reckless manner  
in which post-carmen drive through the streets is  
exceedingly reprehensible, and requires the active inter-  
position of the day watch and Constabulary.

Edward Loughlin, labourer, was severely injured  
yesterday, by a bag of corn falling upon him from Mr.  
Sidley's store, in Henry-street. On being removed to  
Barrington's hospital, it was ascertained by Dr. Kava-  
nagh that he sustained a bad fracture of the leg.

The City swarms with beggars from all parts of the  
County, in consequence of the Magistrates of the sur-  
rounding districts committing vagrants to the county  
gaol for a week or fortnight, and when discharged  
from prison these wretched creatures become a burthen  
on the City rate payers, either for their maintenance  
in the city gaol, or union workhouse.

Catherine Connolly was hanged at Cork on Satur-  
day, for the murder of Mary Driscoll, a child, and  
protected her innocence up to the last moment.

A cargo of Ice, the first ever imported to Limerick,  
arrived in the Shannon yesterday, for Sidley Brothers,  
per *Neptunia* from Sweden.

Capt. G. H. Fitzgerald, government emigration  
agent for Lower Shannon, has transferred his head  
quarters from Kilrush to Tarbert, as being more  
central for inspection of the ships and passengers.

*Ariel*, for Quebec, 89 do. Total, 353 Passengers.

The *Souvenir*, Capt. Jenkins, of and from Lime-  
rick, Messrs. Shaw & Duffield owners, has arrived at  
New York, and landed her passengers all well, after  
the extraordinary quick passage of 18 days, although  
her progress was much impeded with ice during the  
last two days.

The *Stamboul* sailed from Tralee on Saturday for  
New York, with 160 passengers, and another passen-  
ger vessel is to sail on the 25th.
