The case, on examination of complainant (formerly Head Constable of Police), was dismissed by the magistrates, who subsequently refused taking the governor's information against him for perjury.

There are six officers of Inland revenue, and a party of the revenue police, at present stationed in Six-mile-bridge, County Clare, in charge of the paper mill of Messrs. Bullen and Donaldson, in consequence of ill-founded information said to have been conveyed by anonymous correspondents to the Commissioners, alleging that smuggling is carried on in the concerns; and the officers heretofore doing duty at the mill have been transferred to other districts.

This day we had the pleasure of beholding a magnificent head of Broccoli, weighing 14lbs, and grown at the residence of Major General Napier on the North Strand. It is, perhaps, the most splendid specimen of green crop produce, in the cauliflower tribe, ever seen in Limerick, and a very Mammoth in size.

At French park, county of Roscommon, there is a field of 105 acres, all sown with potatoes, which are already over ground.

Monday night some house robbers gained access to Mrs. Villiers' poor school, Upper Henry-street, and carried off wearing apparel and bed covering the property of the master, Mr. Switzer.

Sunday night a mare in foal, the property of Patrick Carroll, near Newport, was stolen off his land, and conveyed to one of the Castle Waller mountains, where it was found crushed to death between two rocks with cuts and bruises inflicted by sticks or missiles. The foal, which had been protruding, was also dead.

Yesterday 20 convicts from Ennis gaol passed thro' this city en route to Spike Island, via railway for Cork. Eighty six convicts from Ennis are ordered to Spike Island depot.

Sixteen convicts, whose sentences were commuted to imprisonment, arrived at Tralee on Friday evening. Val. Duggan and Pat. Clanchy are the names of the men killed by the fall of embankment near the new railway terminus at Galway.

The magistrates of the town of Galway have applied to Parliament to include the salary of their petty sessions clerk in the new bill schedule of Cork, Belfast, and Limerick—150l a year.

Michael Ryan, from the neighbourhood of Castleconnell, who had been undergoing imprisonment in the county gaol for poaching by killing hares, died on Friday, and on Sunday last, at Prospect, his relatives assailed the parties who got up the prosecution, broke window glass, and created disturbance.

At the Medical examination held in Queen's college, Cork, Thomas A. McMahon obtained first prize and first certificate in junior class of Anatomy and Physiology. Mr. McMahon is a native of Limerick.

At Kilkennan fair on Monday last beef was very scarce; mutton at 5d per lb; lambs sold at 18s each; milk cows from £10 to £11 10s; strippers in good demand.

At Six mile bridge petty sessions yesterday, the court was occupied in Fishery cases, at the prosecution of Mr. Alton, of the Board of Conservators, against Mr. Stafford, M.P. The first case was dismissed, Mr. Stafford's witnesses having proved that the weir at Cratloe was established upwards of 30 years, and therefore his right thereto as a several fishery. In the second case, for said weir being illegally constructed, a penalty of 5l. and 12. costs was ruled. Notices of appeal were given in both cases.

At Ennis petty sessions James Moylan and Patrick Moylan were fined £5 and costs for assaulting the police on the fair day of Clonroad. Patrick Coffey was also fined £5 or two months, for assaulting Thos. Keane, Esq. while assisting the police at Clonroad.

Mrs. Dillon McNamara, whose death appeared on Saturday, was the only child of Capt. John Grant, R.N., of Stoke, Devon.

Mr. J. Meehan was declared contractor to supply new milk at the Lunatic Asylum, at 4d per gallon.

Patrick Guthrie, victualler, Mungret-street, while in a state of intoxication, on Saturday night, fell down stairs, fracturing his skull so badly that he died in an hour after.

Sir Thomas N. Redington had an interview yesterday at Cork, with the Agricultural school and model farm committee. He said there should be £2,200 collected, before payment of the Government grant of £4,400. Sir Thomas also visited the workhouse, boys' and girls' schools, hospital wards, work shops, and industrial department, with the latter of which he appeared much pleased.

At the auction of Rathmore, Col. Wyndham's farm, near Six mile bridge, cows and springers averaged at £8, calves £1 16s, and sheep £2; only 36 fat heifers sold, from £6 12s 6d to £9 10s, making an average of £12. The heavy cattle remain on hands.
