A farmer named Ahern, residing at Pallasgrean,  
 committed suicide by cutting his throat with a razor,  
 on Thursday. Thomas Costelloe, Esq. Coroner, held  
 an inquest on the body, when a verdict of insanity  
 was returned. Mr. Costelloe also held an inquest in  
 the same neighbourhood, on the body of a poor man  
 who died from destitution.

The Lafayette American steam ship, with 150 visi-  
 tors from Philadelphia to the Chrystal Palace, arri-  
 ved at Cork on Friday, and left this day for Liverpool.

Last night, James Donald and Patrick Ryan, while  
 getting over the wall of the Tipperary workhouse,  
 were shot in the legs and feet by the officers. Both  
 are notorious characters, and they had a large quan-  
 tity of the workhouse property at the time.
