SPANGL-HILL.—The annual horse and cattle fair held yesterday is pronounced the worst that took place for years, there being little demand for any kind of stock, and at a considerable reduction in prices. No buyers attended for the military. Beef rated at from 37s. to 40s. per cwt. and mutton at 5½d. per lb. The dullness was attributed to the overcrowded state of the English markets.

The fair of Tipperary yesterday was not well attended. The only description of stock which was in request and brought good prices were yearlings. A superior lot of fat cattle belonging to Lord Stanley was not looked after.

Michael Crooke died of starvation on the Fethard road last Wednesday. He had been a very strong man.

Mr. John Fitzgibbon, nephew of the proprietor of the monster house in Cork, was drowned in a boating party near Blackrock castle on Sunday.

Thomas Costelloe, Esq. coroner, held an inquest at Caherconlish on Saturday on the body of a man, named Meagher, found drowned in a dyke.

Dr. M'Cree, of Clondalkin dispensary, has obtained £40 damages against a farmer, Michael Smith, who fractured plaintiff's leg by driving against him.

At the conclusion of his examination at the Apothecaries Hall, on Friday last, Mr. Miles, V. Bourke, of Rathkeale, was complimented in the highest terms by the Court of Examiners, for his superior answering.

Protestants and Roman Catholics recognise this salutary rule.
