DEATHS.

One of the most sincere Christians, whose life was consecrated to every work of benevolence and charity, Mrs. O'REILLY, the widow of Thomas O'Reilly, Esq. departed this life on Sunday evening, at Salt Hill Hotel, Kingstown, in the presence of her beloved and venerated mother, Mrs. Peyley. Her death was unexpected—for tho' her illness was protracted, the physicians pronounced a decided improvement; but, alas, Providence ruled otherwise, and her sainted soul separating from this earthly tabernacle, she fell asleep in the arms of her Saviour. The death of this greatly esteemed lady was not known here until yesterday morning, and to the regret of many who were absent, not knowing when the funeral would be, her mortal remains were conveyed from the Limekiln terminus to Munchin's church, at two o'clock, under heavy rain, and interred amidst the sighs and tears of her relatives and friends; but, we may add, to the greater loss and affliction of the numerous children of Thomond poor school, whose audible lamentations proclaimed irreparable calamity to them.

The death of this most excellent lady, who was the tender parent, the sincere friend, and the constant benefactor of the destitute orphan, whose steps she guided in the paths of religion, charity and peace. We can safely say, her death indeed is to the female children of the labouring poor a grievous public loss. Formed and educated to move with ease in the first private circles, Mrs. O'Reilly's personal accomplishments were sure to attract admiration; but how greatly enhanced were these natural gifts by the pure lustre of her virtues and the endearing amability of her manners. The placid expression of her countenance was singularly engaging, and the features literally beamed with gentleness, innocence, and love, the mild radiance of which at once prepossessed all beholders. Regardless of the flattery and fascination which court a beautiful woman in fashionable assemblies, of the happier though less brilliant scenes of domestic life, Mrs. O'Reilly forsook without regret, at an early period, those peculiar characteristics of her station, and devoted time, health, and fortune to the benefit of the poor, to the instruction of those little children whom God has especially committed to the care of those who love Him, and hope to inherit with them His eternal kingdom. Religion only can afford consolation to her aged and venerable mother, now indeed severely stricken by the death of her beloved and most excellent daughter. Mrs. O'Reilly has left one son the Rev. Dr. O'Reilly, Professor of Maynooth College, and now at Rome. The chief mourners at her funeral were Mr. J. J. Eagar, of Castle Bagot, D.L., Mr. Pease, Major Gavin, and Captain Gavin. All the Chapel bells kept tolling as the mournful procession passed along.
