

Surgeon of the flag ship to ascertain fitness for the service, as to general health, &c. The day of examination is the same as the day of that for Mates, Masters, &c., namely, the first Monday after the first Wednesday. The first Wednesday is the day appointed for examination in Seamanship on board *Victory* for Mates; Navigation, &c., coming the Monday following. The first examination for candidates for Naval Cadetships took place in March last, and has continued regularly. An average of about seven present themselves each time. The examination, altho' easy, is strict, and no second trial is allowed.

Notices for the 26th inst. in this union have been given for enquiry to remove 9 paupers, chargeable on the divisions of Castlecrine—3 from Killokennedy, 3 from Fahymore, and 16 from Clontra.

Two youngsters are lodged in gaol for attempting to fire the parent workhouse of the Limerick union.

Richard M. Lynch, Esq. A.P.L.C., attended at the workhouse of Kilmallock on Tuesday, to hold an investigation into charges preferred by some paupers against the master for ill treatment. The matter is now before the Commissioners, and the result will be known in a few days.

D. Clanchy, Esq. Charleville, is to be the new Chairman of the Kilmallock board of guardians. He is greatly esteemed and regarded for his business habits, and all the guardians have resolved to call on him to act, as he possesses those qualities so essential to a chairman.

In two electoral divisions of Croom union the poor rates are 16s. 5d. in the pound upon Ballingarry, and 15s. 11d. upon Ballyagrain. In this impoverished district there is no rent paid the unfortunate proprietors, nor is there stock on the lands. The fee simple of the soil at present is not equal to sustain the burden of taxation.

At a meeting of the Newcastle board of guardians Michael Leahy, Esq. presiding, there were three candidates for the situation of school-master. Mr. Daniel Ahern, the assistant master, was appointed as the most efficient. Mr. Mulvihill was appointed assistant school master *pro tem*. Mr. James Power was declared contractor for 20 stone of wool at 16s per stone. Miss Dartnell resigned as matron of Knockaderry auxiliary house. The Commissioners recommended the guardians to increase the wages of the clerk of works to 25s. per week. The number in the house was 3,500; number on out door relief 1,248; cost of do. £31 1s 2d, Cost of provisions for the week £167 16s. Amount received during the week, £2,650; paid £577; balance in favour of guardians £2,823.

The Galway union rate just struck varies from 1s. to 5s. 0d. in the £.

Sixty clever, strong, and healthy young women, comfortably and neatly clothed, arrived on Monday afternoon in this city, by the steamer, from Kilrush workhouse; and yesterday left by rail, to embark at Cork for Canada. We could only wish that the Hon. and Rev. S. G. Osborne had seen these hearty dames, as it might dispel his monomania about the ghastly starvation of the Kilrush union paupers.

Mr. T. B. Hurley refuses to give his brother guardians at Tralee the name of the contractor who tendered him money three times to pay the amount due of his contract.

There left the Cashel and Tuam workhouses last week 2000 paupers.

The *Nereid* from Limerick with 153 passengers arrived at Quebec the 19th July.

In the New York United States district court Judge Betts granted a decree condemning and directing the sale of the schooner *Brilliant*, Capt. Smith, which had arrived from Galway, for carrying an excess of passengers over the number allowed by law.
