DEATH OF THE RT. HON. EARL CLARE.

With deep and sincere regret we announce the
death of the Rt. Hon. Earl Clare, of Mountshannon,
near this city, which melancholy event occurred at
his residence in Brighton on Monday last. He was in
truth a dignified nobleman; possessed of considerable
talents, he displayed them for the advantage of
his fellow creatures, and it may be said he
terminated his earthly career in the work of
humanity, as he never rallied since he was af-
flicted by fever, taken whilst visiting the hospital of
the union workhouse in this city. He was bland,
considerate, and condescending—the advocate of every
measure which tended to the happiness and welfare of
his country; a constant resident at his magnificent seat
near this city, where he administered unboundedly to
his neighbours, and his hospitality was the most re-
cherche. His ever to be lamented death has left a
chasm which will not be easily filled up; as a land-
lord he was the fosterer of a happy and contented
tenantry; as a magistrate his advice and counsel were
respected and acted on. We believe few of his rank
was more esteemed by his brother peers, and none
more respected by the gentry of this county. His
lordship was born the 10th June, 1792, and is suc-
ceeded in his title and estates by his only brother, the
Hon. Richard Fitzgibbon, Colonel of the county
Limerick Militia, who resigned the Lord Lieu-
tenancy of this county on his leaving to reside in
London. The present Lord represented this county
in Parliament for many years, and from what is
known of his estimable qualities, there is no
doubt but he will adopt and imitate the bene-
volent acts of his distinguished brother. The late
Earl filled many important and honorable offices;
as Governor General of Bombay some years ago, he
was presented with a service of plate by the East India
Directors, as a token of his valuable services. He
was Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the
county Limerick, Knight of St. Patrick, and Chair-
man of several Boards connected with the city and
county of Limerick.
