DEATHS.

On Sunday, at Kilkee, aged 18 years, Berkley, eldest son of Berkley Westropp, of London, Esq.—a young gentleman of unassuming manners, possessed of considerable talents, and a cultivated mind. His death is a source of deep regret to his afflicted parents and a numerous circle of attached friends. His remains were interred this morning in the family vault at the Cathedral.
Of a lingering illness, on the 16th July last, at the Cape, aged 37 years Charles, eldest son of Lieut.-Col. Smyth, late of this City, leaving a wife and one child.
Suddenly, on Monday, Joseph Bewley, Esq. one of the purest philanthropists in Dublin; and during the Irish famine this worthy good man exerted himself night and day in the cause of humanity, and his health never recovered from the personal sacrifices he then made.
On Friday last, at his seat, Palmerston, near Dublin, John, Earl of Donoughmore, in the 64th year of his age. He has left two sons (the eldest of whom, Lord Suidale, succeeds to the title and estates) three daughters, and an amiable widow. The late Earl was John Hely Hutchinson, Earl of Donoughmore, Viscount Suidale, and Baron Donoughmore, of Knocklofty (Viscount Hutchinson, of Knocklofty, county Tipperary, in the United Kingdom.) He was Knight of St. Patrick, Privy Councillor for Ireland, and Lieutenant of the co. Tipperary.
