

Mr. Andrew Egan has contracted to flag the town of Tuam for 647l.

Since the 1st September last, there was shipped from Limerick for the English and Scotch market 500 quarters wheat, 2,354 quarters barley, 44,161 quarters oats, 1475 cwt flour, 300 cwt oatmeal, mostly of this season's produce; and since 1st May last, 47,140 firkins butter.

This morning the *John Munn* screw steamer, placed on the line by the Limerick Shipping Company, sailed for London with a full cargo of corn, butter, provisions, and 20 deck passengers.

A potato, of the ordinary size, was found this day on one of the loads at market, distinctly marked with the impress of human features—the eyes, chin, forehead, and cheeks quite manifest, but the ears not so prominent, though discernible. So remarkable a *lusus nature* in the vegetable creation we apprehend has never been seen.
