OBITUARY.—Died in his quarters at Newtown
Barracks, Belize, Honduras, on the 13th Dec. 1851,
Lieut. Alexander Mackenzie, Royal Engineers, after
a short attack of bilious fever. The untimely and unex-
pected demise of this young gentleman has thrown a
shade of sorrow over the garrison that will not
lightly pass away. He was beloved by his brother
officers, for the affectionate gentleness and candour
of his manners, the unspotted integrity of his life,
sterling qualities, which were in him, combined with
such high professional attainments, as commanded
the respect of the most competent judges. His re-
mains, borne on a gun carriage and drawn by a de-
tachment of the Royal Artillery, were attended to the
grave by the whole of the garrison, and a large as-
