MYSTERIOUS MURDER IN THIS COUNTY.

DISCOVERY OF THE BODY.

On Saturday last as a countryman named Patrick
Blake was passing through a mesdow at Drombane,
near Dromkeen, in this county, his attention was
attracted to a spot in the field where the grass ap-
peared to have been newly laid on in sods, as if cut
by a spade. Struck with this appearance, curiosity
induced him to turn up the ground, conceiving,
perhaps, some hidden treasure was concealed beneath,
and in a few minutes, to his horror and amazement,
the body of a human being was exposed to view!
Blake carefully removed the remainder of the earth,
which entombed the corpse, and, on close examina-
tion of the features, identified the body as that of a
farmer named James Quinlan, who had been missing
from his home since Christmas. The alarm being
given the relatives and friends of deceased soon hur-
ried to the spot, with the police of the station, by
whom the body was raised, and stretched upon the
field. A gun shot wound was discovered on the right
breast, and blood was discernible on the shirt of de-
ceased, which was the only article of dress visible,
notwithstanding that on the day he left home he wore
a new frieze frock coat, vest and trowsers.

Next day Thomas Costelloe, Esq. coroner, held an
inquest on the body, and Dr. Ryan, of Newpallas,
having made a *post mortem* examination, found that
death was caused by a gun shot wound, which entered
the right breast, passed through the lungs, and came
out at the left side. The jury returned a verdict of
wilful murder against some person or persons un-
known, and the police are on the alert for information
to lead to the discovery of the perpetrators of this
diabolical deed, but no clue has yet been had.
