

HOMICIDE.—In last CHRONICLE we stated that a man named John Hogan was in a dangerous state in Barrington's hospital from the effects of a wound which he received on Tuesday evening at the hands of his brother-in-law, Denis Connors, who stabbed him with a knife in the abdomen, at his house Custom-house place. We regret to add that the sufferer died next day, and in consequence an inquest was held by Dr. Murphy, coroner, with Alderman Watson, Dr. Gibson, and P. G. Barron, Esq., on Thursday and Friday, in the board room of the City Infirmary. No direct testimony was given by the witnesses examined to show that the prisoner, Connors, had stabbed deceased, but previous to his death the unfortunate man made an information before Mr. Barron, to the effect that Connors was the man who inflicted the wound with a shoemakers knife. It also appeared that the deceased and prisoner had a fight, blows being exchanged between them: The Jury returned the following verdict—"That John Hogan came by his death from the effects of a wound inflicted by Denis O'Connor in his own defence." The witnesses examined were Patrick Connors (son of prisoner), Dr. Darrac, Sub-Constable O'Brien, (Croom), Dr. Gore, Dr. Bourke, Mr. J. S. Dwyer, J.P., Mr. Barron, R.M., and J. Coffrey.

LIMERICK UNION.—The guardians met on Wednesday, John Barrington, Esq. presiding. A letter was read from the commissioners intimating that if the board did not agree to increase the salary of the medical officers to be appointed to the city dispensary, they would do so. The guardians resolved to adhere to their former decision of having two medical officers at £50 per annum, or four at £25 each. Number of paupers in the workhouse, 5,400, being 2,200 less than the corresponding week of last year. Amount of rate collected during week, £8,976; paid out, £756; balance in bank, £327.

The preparatory arrangements for the concert and accommodation of the visitors, were creditable to Mr. P. Corbett.

Catherine Hayes arrived in New Orleans. The monthly Horse auction at Mr. Hartigan's Repository, this day, was numerously attended by purchasers, and sales were quickly effected; there were buyers from England and Scotland present, and the prices obtained fully realised the anticipations of those who sent in steeds for auction. The catalogue contained 130 entries, and all went off well.
