

Admitted during week, 1,400 paupers; discharged, 114; died, 7. Amount of rate collected, £305 15s; paid out, £744; in bank to credit of guardians, £158 17s.

A meeting was held this day in St. Patrick's church-yard, and resolutions adopted, to dispute the right of control of the Rector over the cemetery.

Pierce Creaghe, Esq. on his return home from Clonmonee, where he spent Sunday evening with his family to his house at Ralahine, Newmarket on Fergus, in a covered car was fired at, but we are rejoiced to say, escaped without injury, the slugs having lodged in the cover of the car. Mr. Creaghe has taken part of the lands of Trenchahow, surrendered by a man named Casey, and was to have come into possession on the 25th inst. The intended victim is a gentleman much and deservedly respected; he is an upright, honorable man and most inoffensive. There was a meeting of magistrates at Six mile bridge yesterday, when they unanimously resolved to offer a reward for the authors of the above outrage.

Sergeant O'Brien did not conclude the Naas assizes until last night.

Mr Edmund McCarthy is appointed Sessional Crown Prosecutor for the city of Cork.

John Walsh is found guilty at Kilkenny Assizes of the murder of his brother-in-law, Thomas Ball, in December 1847. The prisoner's daughter charged as accomplice in the crime, was acquitted. Ball, it appears, had procured Walsh for £3, and this instigated the murder, after which he buried the body in the yard of his house, where it was found in three years after. A poor woman who lived in the neighbourhood was returning from market the night of the murder, and to light her pipe turned towards Walsh's door, which was shut, but seeing light through the cabin window, she looked in and beheld Ball on the floor bloody and dying, Walsh and his daughter standing over him. This woman who was the principal witness for the prosecution, kept what she had seen a secret for near three years, Walsh in the interim pretending that his brother-in-law had gone to America, but on her confession of the deed, the body was discovered and identified. The culprit is sentenced to be hanged the 22d April.

GALWAY ASSIZES.—The action for assault, in Colles v. Robertson, was withdrawn on this apology, "Having at a moment of great excitement, while in company with Mr. Colles, at a hotel in Oughterard, struck him, I beg to express my great regret for the act, and I request he will accept this apology—John Robertson." In T J Bodkin v. Rev. John Pius Leahy, OSD, an issue from the Incumbered Estates Court, to try if a mortgage of the late James Bodkin, of Rahoon, for £2,000, was paid off before sale of the property, the jury found the issue in favour of the plaintiff, that the sum was discharged. In Sir George Shee v. Poor Law Commissioners, to compensate for damages to Dunmore family mansion, held as an auxiliary work-house of Tuam union, there was a verdict for £170 to plaintiff. Judge Crampton sentenced for burglary, 21 prisoners to transportation; and Chief Justice Lefroy eleven.

Michael Kyne was tried at Galway for embezzling £5 the property of the guardians of the Outerard union, he being a poor-rate collector. It appearing by the poor law regulations that collectors were not allowed to receive any money on account of rate, short of the entire amount due, the indictment was not sustained, and prisoner was acquitted.

The Antrim Grand Jury presented £1447 to repair the streets of Belfast, and £1000 to build a bridewell at Antrim.

Thomas Sheehan, who had gone to Limerick to look for employment, died suddenly on Sunday night at his lodgings in Bennis, on his return home.

Sir Thomas N Redington has subscribed £20, and Lord Dunsandle £10 to the cattle show at Galway.

The Earl of Cork has subscribed £50 towards the Munster provincial exhibition in that city, and Daniel Leahy, Esq. £5.

One of the London steamers, Shamrock, trading from Limerick, called at Tarbert, to complete her cargo of barley, shipped by Mr. Spaight from his stores there. Great inconvenience was felt in the absence of a pier, and it is hoped that the proposition of the Kerry Grand Jury to have a public pier built, under the superintendence of the Board of Works, will be promptly carried out.

The bone dust of Galway gaol is sold out a 2s 3d per bushel, for manure, and all bones brought to the prison, are bought up for grinding.

Tuesday night a corpse was burnt to cinders in a work-house at Belfast, where the company got drunk, the candles lighting the bed clothes, and the living escaped as best they could.
