The late John Maude, Esq. was interred at St. John's Church, Wakefield, on Monday last.  
The robbers who broke into Gort church, and carried away several portions of the furniture, were sentenced to 7 months' imprisonment and hard labour at Galway assizes. The Dean of Kilmacduagh has recovered all the stolen property.  
The Right Rev Dr. Ryan will leave this on Monday next for Dublin to attend the monthly funeral service for the late Archbishop Murray.  
The Rt. Rev. Dr. Vaughan, has appointed the Rev. Michael Dinan, from the Curacy of Scariff, to the parish of O'Connell, vacant by the death of the Rev. Mr M'Cormac, PP.  
Archbishop MacHale preached at Sligo Chapel on St. Patrick's Day, for the Ursuline convent there, and condemned the National education system.  
Lord Roden said there were 10,000 converts to the Protestant Church in Archbishop Mac Hale's diocese, and no National school. In the Gort district of Tuam diocese there are seven such schools.  
The Roman Catholics of St Mary's, Shandon, Cork have memorialled the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council, against a recent valuation of house property for ministers' money, by the rector.  
The Rev. Mr. Scanlan, P. P. handed to the Nenagh grand jury £5 restitution money, to be placed to the credit of the barony of Upper Ormond.  
William Perrier, Esq. is elected Alderman of Cork, vice Hodder resigned, and R L Jameson, Esq. town councillor.  
Mr William Sampson on Thursday bought the fee simple of George Porter, in Ballinuaue, Galway, for £1,500.  
At Cork, Sadleir & Hill was tried, an issue by the Court of Chancery, to determine in whom was vested the property in certain goods and chattels at Mitchelstown Castle, seized by the sheriff of the county Cork, on the 1st Sept. under a writ of *fi fa* against the Earl of Kingston. The jury found for defendant as to certain articles not enumerated in the schedule, and for plaintiff as to the residue, subject to be turned into a general verdict for the plaintiff.  
The establishment at Mountmellick has already cost the Beet root sugar company £11,000. The outlay of itself must have conferred immense benefit on that locality, but they give daily employment of 100 persons beside. The company give 15s a ton for beet, which will leave a profit to the grower.  
Lord Gort gained £6 17s 6d an acre by preserving the seed of the flax grown on his lands last year.  
The Galway harbour commissioners summoned before the local magistrates Capt. Richards, of the Pandora, for bringing his vessel into dock without a licensed pilot. Counsellor Duggan objected that the case should be decided by the harbour board, and the case was postponed for a week. The penalty is £5.  
On Friday, a little boy, son to Mr. Wm. O'Leary, of Cooneen, Nenagh, whilst passing a vessel of boiling water on the kitchen floor, accidentally fell in, and death soon put a period to his sufferings.  
A bridge is to be erected across the Slaney at Wexford, to cost £14,000, and the trustees offer £100 premium for the best plan.  
The extensive farm offices of Abraham Fisher, near Youghal, were burnt down on Thursday morning.
