The triennial visitation of the Queen's College, Cork, will take place on the 11th May. The proceedings will be open to the public.

The Galway board of Guardians have commenced law proceedings against Lord Campbell, Chief Justice of the English Court of Queen's Bench, for the eviction of families from his property in that union, without notice to the relieving officer.
