

petty sessions yesterday Patk Hennessy and five others were sentenced to one month's imprisonment and to be whipped for stealing a silver watch from the Rev Wm Murray in the person of Martin Leonard, charged with receiving stolen goods under false pretences from a serjeant of the militia in whom he enlisted, having been previously convicted in the 14th, was remanded; also Mary O'Connell having a stolen coat in her possession; she was ordered to find security to keep the same; John M'Donnell, cabinet maker, was sentenced to a month's imprisonment for entering the house of Mr M'Carthy, Francis-st., and assaulting the same; Michael Mean, apprentice to Mr M'Carthy, housepainter and paper manufacturer, was sentenced to 28 days imprisonment for stealing a watch, and absenting himself; John Fogarty, and whose brother was executed at the gallows in 1849, with Mrs Dillon, for the murder of a man, was fined 4s for assaulting a Police-sergeant; persons were fined for having dogs unlicensed; warrants were issued against 12 defaulters, Mr Gromwell, collector of St. Michael's parish, and six spirit retailers, summoned by the magistrates, fined 10s each, for having their houses searched on Monday morning and Sunday night; Johanna O'Connell was fined 12s 6d for maliciously injuring the property of Mrs Leo.

Patrols have been ordered to patrol the vicinity of the market and butterweigh house, in order to prevent the drivers' cars being plundered.

Inspector General of the Police inspected the Kilfinane bridewell and was much favourably of the state of the same. He suggested the construction of a separate cell for drunkards and prisoners.

Seventy prisoners for trial before Serjeant Thurles sessions this week, and at the same time 500 processes, 300 of them for trial.

The Grand Jury cess this summer is 2s 9d in the pound.

Police constable John Enright, of the Thurles station, was robbed by five men, one named Cormack, and fifteen robbers more, who entered his house. Upon information of a robbery near Holy cross, the policeman got a warrant to search his house and he found the mutton, the robbers in their beds; they are now in Nenagh gaol. Welcome news for the district to have so many robbers removed from among them for three years. Sub Constable Enright much to be congratulated on his exertions on this and other occasions. Barry was elected coroner for the county of Kerry, on Wednesday, without opposition, in the place of the late Mr Geran.

John Henry W Ellis, at Wildfield, Killarney, was committed to Mr J O'Connell, for £1700.

John Conmee, of Mayo, is declared a bankrupt; his income is £100 annually, and £3000 worth of property.
