The Mastership of Boherbuoy auxiliary workhouse is vacant by the death of Mr Wm. Gough, the third officer of that class who has fallen a victim to his duties in less than three years.

The medical officers of the union workhouses in Ireland have presented a complimentary farewell address to Denis Phelan, Esq. late Medical Inspector of Poor law unions, and now permanent Inspector at Strabane for the northern district.

At a meeting of the Newcastle guardians, Edward Curling, Esq. VC, presiding, the Rev Mr O'Brien, PP of Knockaderry, applied for a district dispensary in his parish in connexion with Newcastle, but the board came to the resolution not to allow it. Mr Spaight wrote for debentures for the amount of £500 due to him for emigration. Messrs O'Neil and Sons were declared contractors for supplying best hackled flax at 8½d per lb. Messrs Barry, Fennel and Mulcahy, fishery commissioners, held a court in Killarlin yesterday, to adjudicate on the disputed weir at Reenacanna, in Dood & Hurly.

A good supply of salmon peel is expected by fishermen in the Shannon the ensuing week.

The pawn office of Mr B Sheehan, Cork, was robbed on Tuesday night of money and watches.

Two children of a servant man named Lenihan, were accidentally burnt to death in a house off Old George's-st. Cork, on Saturday night.

The Recorder of Galway, Wm. O'Hara, Esq. is the only un-paid judge in Ireland.

A diabolical attempt to upset the carriages on the Midland Great Western Railway was made on Thursday near Athenry, by placing large stones on the line, but, fortunately, the obstruction was removed before the arrival of the train.

Sir Thomas Redington has contributed £20 to the national Cattle show at Galway.

Mr Francis Seymour took a benefit at Tralee on Friday night as Earl Osmund in the Castle Spectre. He previously enacted Octavian in the Mountaineers, and Dr O'Toole in the Irish Tutor.

The estate of Benjamin Deeble, of Cork, bankrupt, was sold on Monday in that city to Mr Dixon for £5700.

Miss Knox has received, from Capt Laffan, R E, £5 towards the support of the Ennis Industrial school, per Rev Charles Ward.

On the 1st inst the first steamer for the season reached Quebec from Montreal.
