rick Harbour board was held yesterday, when the follow-  
ing resolution was adopted:—"That several members  
of the Board having seen a large body of the labourers  
now working at the Docks parading the streets last  
evening as an organised mob, we hereby declare our  
strong disapproval of any interference on the part of  
such of these men as are not electors at the ensuing  
election for this city; and in case of any disregard of  
this caution, we shall recommend the immediate dis-  
missal from employment of the parties so offending."  
This resolution was transmitted directly by post to  
the Board of Works, Dublin.

Dr. Murphy, Coroner, held an inquest on Thursday,
