An inquest was held yesterday in Upper Williamstreet, by William C. Doctors Parker, V. Russell, and Elmes were in attendance on the Coroner. An analysis of the medicine of which the deceased had partaken was made by Dr Parker, who detected therein a very deadly irritant. The Jury found that the deceased came by his death by poison taken as medicine. The subject is undergoing further examination by Dr Parker, to whom such cases are deservedly referred in this district; and in his hands we have no doubt of such a conclusion as must prove fully satisfactory.
